We are following up on our original letter dated 30 November 2024 requesting that the consumers of safer nicotine products be given an opportunity to have consumer views considered in the process of developing your country's position in the run up to World Health Organization's 11th Conference of the Parties (COP11) of the Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) later this year in November. We implore you to consider that recent events make our request, as citizens and consumers, more urgent.

As you may be aware, recently there have been numerous reports on the successes in Sweden, Japan, New Zealand and the UK with regards to adults choosing not to smoke, but instead using safer nicotine products. These countries chose to regulate safer nicotine products, giving their citizens access, choice, and freedom to make the switch. In turn, the smoking rates in these countries have dropped significantly in the past two years, all because of countries who have chosen to embrace harm reduction for tobacco in order to improve health outcomes for their citizens, who would otherwise use deadly tobacco products. These countries engaged with their constituents and opened their doors to all relevant stakeholders to develop and implement these policies.

The FCTC process needs to include relevant country experience and data, such as can be provided by from countries who have implemented tobacco harm reduction as part of their public health policies, as well as those who have chosen, for whatever reason, to severely restrict or prohibit safer nicotine products. There is opportunity in the legitimate FCTC process to discuss the possibilities with those countries who have yet embraced tobacco harm reduction, and explore the experiences of those delegations who have severely restricted or banned safer nicotine products. Both sides of the debate are of equal importance and deserve equal attention, as such, should be able to freely discuss their motivations without reprimand or backlash from NGO's and other outside parties who are not responsible for public health policy in your country.
